# The necessity for place-based bicultural tools in Aotearoa New Zealand's Town Planning

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## Research context in Aotearoa New Zealand

- Town planning is led by councils, with expert-led approaches
- Lack of recommendations supporting authentic collaboration with Māori
- Lack of mechanisms to enable community and hāpu-led town planning
- Community engagement: often {only} consultation processes

- Kinship and guardianship
- Reciprocity
- Ancestral / Spiritual connections

#### **Planning framework**

- Tenure [owning/renting]
- Management and production
- Socio-economic development
- Cadastre [land parcels]




## **Research objectives**



There is a need to include Māori values in land-use planning and apply a bicultural approach (Harmsworth 1997, 2004)


Māori have a long and unique approach to design and planning. It is not just about outcomes but also processes, traditions and methodologies

(Matunga, 2013, 2018)

Current approaches often fail to incorporate local realities and cultural values and aspirations of communities (Kingi et al, 2013)

The integration of Mātauranga
Māori into urban planning can assist
local authorities to achieve
sustainability goals (Awatere et al, 2013)








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

## Place-based tool mapping traditional stories and local mātauranga to ground urban regeneration

Engaging Ngāti Whakaue in revisiting past spatial transformations in Ōhinemutu toward the reaffirmation of core values for the community to lead future transformation

### **Discussion**

The necessity for place-based bicultural tools in Aotearoa New Zealand's Town Planning

- Structures of recognition: Māori planning, mātauranga, and views as planning foundation
- Authentic partnerships: Mediated through empathy, mutual trust, purpose and continuity
- <u>Engagement is more than technology:</u> Culturally appropriate, and robust technology should support Māori planning pathways (not the other way around)
- Engagement is more than 'another box to tick': Collaborative partnerships can strengthen planning
- Co-creation is a methodological pathway toward transformational tools and processes
